Enduring Pain, Embracing Unity: Dr. Alamolhoda Call to Strengthen the Islamic Republic and Global Resistance

Excerpts from the speech of Dr. Alamolhoda, wife of Martyr President Raisi and a faculty member of Shahid Beheshti University, at the function held in Ferdowsi University of Mashhad to commemorate the martyrdom of Dr. Raisi:

The most painful experience for humans is the pain of separation. We enter this world through separation and force others to endure it when we leave. Iranian literature often depicts the anguish of parting, described by Rumi as the ney (reed) that laments, recounting tales of separation. As humans descend from the realm of angels to enter this world, they ultimately depart and, leaving their loved ones behind, inflict pain upon them. Yet this pain can also be transformative and purifying, presenting an opportunity for a nation's growth. The global community was amazed by the deep emotions displayed by the Iranian people towards their president and his companions.

The Supreme Leader expressed gratitude to God Almighty, emphasizing that this martyrdom propelled the system several steps forward. He stated that the martyrdom was as significant for the system as the president's life had been. I too am grateful, and I urge all of you to praise the Lord, as what occurred truly constituted a referendum of hearts.

The heroic Iranian nation suffered great sorrow and, in mourning the martyrdom of their president, created an epic. The resistance movement must breathe new life into itself. The upcoming days are crucial for resistance, and we must create an extraordinary feat. I am concerned that people may consider resting after this ceremony, but instead, we should strive even harder. With the honor bestowed upon us, we must support the axis of resistance.

Dear brothers and sisters, Gaza continues to suffer, and the resistance movement stands alone. Visitors from other countries have expressed their worry over losing a key supporter, but I assured them that we have the Supreme Leader and the people of Iran who will stand by the resistance front until the very end.

In the future, I hope for a more groundbreaking era where you will contribute to scientific and cultural endeavors, transforming Iran's movement into a global resistance movement.

Dr. Raisi's reflections on women and family issues

As believers and libertarians, we advocate for the inclusion of respect for divine religions in the glob-

al agenda. The United Nations should establish a mechanism to uphold this respect.

Alongside the conflict targeting Islam, there is a parallel assault on the institution of the family. The family, as the oldest, most enduring, fundamental, and innate human structure, faces significant challenges in the contemporary world.

Crimes against humanity now involve not just land occupation and innocent killings, but also intrusion on the fundamental human institution of the family. Protecting family and marital privacy, which symbolizes the union of a man and a woman, stands as a universal truth that should become a shared global priority. Education, human progress, and excellence reach their peak within the realm of family values. Fabricated narratives about marriage and gender aim to erase timeless ideals like mother, father, and the natural family, potentially constituting crimes against humanity and acting as catalysts for the destruction of the human race. It is our duty to resist such ideologies. Currently, a global movement advocating for the family is crucial to empower all family members to lead fulfilling lives together. We call on all world leaders and religious figures to fulfill their historical duty by championing the true essence of the family and opposing false narratives. We expect the United Nations to recognize the esteemed and authentic essence of the family, making it a priority on their agenda.

Governments place a strong emphasis on women and family affairs.

The topic of "women and family" presents not just issues but also opportunities for effectively addressing many societal problems. Empowering women, increasing their social participation at managerial levels, and ensuring the full realization of women's rights within the Iranian-Islamic ecosystem are foundational policies emphasized by the government.

The Islamic Republic's approach to women is neither the Western instrumental view of women nor a perspective that denies women a social role and status. Instead, it is a third perspective, where women can be companions in society alongside men and play a crucial role within the family structure.

Religiosity, conscious influence, responsibility, and participation in political, social, cultural, and sports spheres are key features that the Islamic Revolution



has brought to light through Iranian women.

Reducing women's unemployment rate, achieving a 100% increase in women's sports growth and medal achievements, passing bills to prevent women's victimization and enhance security against misconduct, and focusing on empowering women leading households to improve their health and quality of life are key initiatives in the government's womenfocused efforts.

Defense of Women's Rights

Today, numerous assert support for women's rights, yet in reality, they aim to exploit women. Conversely, our system and Islamic culture sincerely esteem women and are dedicated to actualizing this worth and status. We do not endorse the Western perspective on women and girls as it is utilitarian. Likewise, we oppose the idea of isolating women from society and depriving them of active roles.

Today's world, which according to prominent scholars of future studies, is preparing to enter the paradigm of spirituality, has lost one of its most noble spiritual role models, who was the epitome of selfless service to society. Service and benevolence have been and are respected in all religions, and this is what Dr. John Boyer Noss, in his book "Man's Religions," refers to as the golden rule of all divine and non-divine religions and praises it. In addition to the luminous verses of the Holy Qur'an, many traditions from the Ahl al-Bayt of the Holy Prophet of Islam (PBUH) also confirm this golden rule of religions. For instance, one of the most beautiful statements in this regard is Imam Ali's (AS) letter to his son Imam Hasan (AS)(5)

The purpose of this short note is to highlight that the themes of the divine words were truly embodied in the personality of the great Ayatollah Ebrahim Raisi, who can be an exemplar and role model for all managers and those who intend to sincerely serve their people.

Latin American journalists offer condolences for the martyrdom of **President Raisi**

A number of female journalists from Latin America who took part in the first International Khorshid Media Festival held in Mashhad last year, have offered their condolences to the people of Iran for the martyrdom of President Ebrahim Raisi and Foreign Minister Hossein Amir Abdollahian.

"With deep sorrow, we extend our condolences to the people of the Islamic Republic of Iran for the tragic and sudden loss of Ebrahim Raisi, the President of Iran, and Hossein Amir Abdollahian, the Foreign Minister, as well as six others," 12 Latin American journalists from Argentina, Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, and Uruguay said in a joint statement on Saturday.

The late president's administration co-sponsored the first International Khorshid Media Festival on September 30, 2023, which hosted 100 female journalists from about 40 countries in the eastern city of Mashhad. The festival aimed to shed light on the realities of Iran and the lives of Iranian women.

Khodadad Hosseini, were descendants of Zayd ibn Ali ibn Al Husain (AS)¹. When Dr. Raisi was 5 years old, he lost his father. He completed his primary education at Javadiyeh School and began his seminary education at Nawab School and then

at Ayatollah Mousavinejad School. In 1975, he went to the Qom Seminary and Ayatollah Boroujerdi School to continue his education. For some time, he studied in a school managed by Ayatollah Pasandideh, which functioned under the supervision of Imam Khomeini (RA). In 2013, he received his Ph.D. degree in jurisprudence and law from Shahid Motahari University.

Regarding his personal life, it is noteworthy that he exalted in knowledge, life, and service to the people simultaneously. In 1983, at the age of 23, Dr. Raisi married Dr. Jamileh Sadat Alam alhoda, the eldest daughter of Ayatollah Seyyed Ahmad Alam alhoda. Dr. Alam Al-Hoda obtained her doctorate in the philosophy of education from Tarbiat Modares University and currently serves as a faculty member at Shahid Beheshti University in Tehran. Ayatollah Raisi and Dr. Jamileh Alam al Hoda embraced a simple and religious lifestyle and are blessed with two daughters.

For Raisi, Who Became the Media

In management science, one of the most crucial roles of any manager is defined as the spokesperson of an organization, and on a larger scale, a system and structure. In the so-called era of communications, where we encounter small and large cells of information and communication instead of traditional organizations and systems, we can metaphorically say that micro and macro management act as the media for organizations, systems, and nations. They represent what is said, seen, heard, and exchanged. This media attribute, based on this metaphor, goes far beyond the role of a mere spokesperson and representative. Perhaps for this reason, despite all its flaws and damages, we now face media personalities instead of just politicians and diplomats. These individuals, with their media attribute (being media and media-like), help create order amidst the chaos of information and communication flows and sometimes challenge global macrostructures in favor of their nations and governments. Regardless of any negative or positive achievements, Ayatollah Seyed Ebrahim Raisi can be named as the first generation of senior executive managers in Iran who, in the era of communications, elevated the experience of being media to becoming the media. Martyr Raisi, both in the field of executive management within Iran and abroad, strived to fulfill this role correctly and, in this way, became a symbol for statesmen and diplomats of the Iranian government, representing Islamic identity and character.

This continued up until the moment of his martyrdom, so much so that many of his opponents were also saddened and affected by his tragic death. Raisi achieved martyrdom in the course of his service, passing away in the high mountains and rainy weather, right after returning from a trip that fostered friendship and cooperation between two nations. This media frame is full of meaningful symbols for government employees as well as international individuals and officials. Even in terms of international communications, Iran found a new face. This face was influenced by a zealous pursuit of progress and a deep connection to the nation and government on a spiritual level, based on honesty and love.

This concept could serve as a suitable representation of Iran and Iranians in both external and internal perceptions for years to come.

On a chilly autumn night in Mashhad's Noghan neighborhood, Seyyed Haji and Asmat al-Sadat became parents to a baby boy named Ebrahim. Ebrahim was still in his childhood when Seyyed Haji passed away, marking the onset of difficult times for the family.





As Ebrahim grew into adolescence, he followed his father's path by pursuing studies in the seminaries of Mashhad and Qom, advancing to the level of jurisprudence and Islamic legal principles. He later earned a doctoral degree in jurisprudence and private law from Shahid Motahari Higher Education School. Raised in a devout family, Ebrahim began his revolutionary activities in 1977 in response to insults directed at Imam Khomeini by the Ettela'at newspaper, participating in demonstrations and clerical protests.



Following the revolution's victory, Seyyed Ebrahim met Martyr Beheshti and was trained by him to contribute to the formation of the Islamic system's managerial cadre. In 1980, he entered the judicial arena for the first time as the deputy prosecutor of Karaj by decree of Martyr Ghodosi. He was highly motivated and diligent, achieving notable success that led to his simultaneous appointment as the prosecutor of Hamedan.



In 1982, Seyyed Ebrahim married Jamileh Alamolhoda, the eldest daughter of Seyyed Ahmad Alamolhoda, and they had two daughters from this union.

His golden era of judicial and managerial career continued after Imam's demise, and the resolution of many controversial cases was the result of Seyyed Ebrahim's tireless efforts day and night, alongside his colleagues.

In 2021, with over 40 years of executive and managerial judicial experience, he was elected as the 13th President with 18 million votes and ascended to the presidency.

A dedicated scholar and compassionate mujahid, who embodied Islamic ethics singlehandedly, endured opponents' mockery and bad manners, was familiar with people's endless suffering, worked tirelessly, and believed that with trust in God, things could be achieved and instilled hope in the people.



However, his wife and their daughters knew from the outset that Ebrahim was a man of the field, so immersed in his work and responsibilities that he spent little time with them. He handled such complex legal cases that his reputation reached Imam Khomeini's office, and with special decrees from the Imam, his responsibilities for solving people's problems multiplied several times over.



On May 20, 2024, to the great astonishment and dismay of the people, news of the helicopter carrying Seyyed Ebrahim and his companions crashing was released, and Raisi, beloved by his martyred companions, joined his martyred supporters and was remembered fondly.
